Assembly Delegates also deserve praise for passing a motion that supports the option of Single Choice Early Action (SCEA) as an admission option along with Early Decision and Early Action without restrictions. It was representative democracy at its best.

ASSEMBLY UPDATE

This year's Delegate Assembly was a particularly busy one. New England was represented by 21 delegates, one more than last year, and we remain the largest delegation of the 23 State and Regional Affiliates. The delegates from New England worked hard to represent the concerns of all of the New England constituents and provided thoughtful deliberation to the issues at hand. Starting bright and early on the day before the official start of the conference, the delegates met for Assembly 1 to hear from the candidates for President-Elect and Vice President for Professional Development. Delegates received reports from various committees including the Fiscal Oversight Committee with the proposed 2005 budget. Several motions were presented to be voted on in Assembly 2, and the delegates had the opportunity for open discussion on these motions as well as the budget. Brad MacGowan, president of New England ACAC, was the first to present a motion to the Assembly to expand the definition of Early Action to also include a definition of Early Action-Single Choice in the Statement of Principles of Good Practice.

All voting occurred during Assembly 2. The first order of business was to elect the officers for NACAC. Sherri Geller of Brandeis University was elected as Vice President for Professional Development, the first New England member of the NACAC Executive Board in many years. Beverly Henry Wheeler of Texas ACAC was elected as President-Elect. A significant portion of Assembly 2 was concerned with the definition of Early Action in the SPGP. The Assembly went to a "committee of the whole" so that all of the motions regarding the "Early" definitions could be presented to the delegates before they had to vote on them. Initially, there were seven motions presented on this issue, but many were withdrawn, including the earlier one submitted by Brad MacGowan. After much discussion and careful deliberation, the motion "We move that the NACAC Admissions Practices Committee and adopt Single Choice Early Action to the Admission Decision option." was passed. The budget also passed.

"Under-represented Areas" are defined as rural or urban secondary schools, EOP/TRIO agencies and programs and community/technical colleges in New England which (preferably) are not members of NEACAC. To qualify, candidates should work in settings adversely im-

pacted by budget cuts or limitations and, as such, could not afford the cost of NEACAC membership or attendance at the Annual Meeting.

DEAN WILLIAM S. NEAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND ESTABLISHED

Thousands Mourn "The Chief," an Elmira College Legend, Leader



Dean William S. Neal passed away on February 25, 2004, at his desk, in the Office of Admissions at Elmira College. In recognition of Dean Neal's unique and outstanding service to higher education, his commitment to countless Elmira College students, parents and alumni, and his passionate resolve in the profession of College Admissions, a scholarship fund has been created to honor Dean Neal.

Bill's family and Elmira College have established the Dean William S. Neal Endowed Scholarship to be awarded annually to a student who exemplifies the qualities and promise that Dean Neal lived by and admired. The funds will be used for the purpose of helping young men and women meet their academic goals, persons who, without this scholarship, may not have had the opportunity to attend and excel at Elmira College.

Witty, Brilliant and Adored

His humor was legendary and he was one of the most memorable individuals at the College and in the field of admissions at the national level. He is mourned by thousands of students, alumni, faculty, staff and colleagues.

Dean Neal earned Bachelor's and Master's degrees in Electrical Engineering from the University of New Hampshire. He was a member of Phi Beta Kappa, Tau Beta Pi and Pi Mu Epsilon honor societies. He completed additional graduate work in solid state physics at Worcester Polytechnic Institute under a National Science

Foundation Faculty Fellowship. He was a design engineer in the aerospace industry for nine years, a faculty member for twenty-two years, an admissions officer for thirty-two years, including twenty-four years as a chief admissions officer.

Respected by Colleagues and Students Alike

Dean Neal won the Douglas Anderson Award for Administrative Excellence, the Elmira College Student Association Administrator of the Year Award and was selected by the Class of 1996 as its Candlelight Ceremony Speaker.

Dr. Thomas Meier, President of Elmira College lauded Bill's contributions at a memorial service held on campus and attended by hundreds of Bill's family, friends and colleagues. In his eulogy, Dr. Meier noted that "Bill Neal was a truly great man, an American original, a higher education icon and an Elmira College Legend." Bill is survived by Maxine, his wife of 43 years, who serves the College on the President's Advisory Council; two sons, one daughter, and four granddaughters.

On October 2, 2004, the National Association for College Admissions Counseling (NACAC) awarded Dean Neal the Margaret E. Addis Award posthumously at its National Conference in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. This award recognizes a person who has provided NACAC with unique and outstanding service and was created by the Association in recognition of an honored, long-time respected leader of NACAC. Over 4,000 admissions professionals attended the Conference. The award was accepted by Bill's wife, Max, who was accompanied by their daughter, Barbara Neal.
