

#### Introduction

NEACAC is one of the largest and most active affiliates of the National Associate of College Admission Counseling (NACAC) and provides our 3600+ members a wide range of resources. Our mission states:

The New England Association for College Admission Counseling leads, supports, and advances the work of counseling, admission, and enrollment professionals by promoting ethical responsibility, professional development, and state, regional, and national advocacy as they help all students realize their full educational potential, with particular emphasis on the transition to post-secondary education.

The leadership and dedicated work of our Executive Board and Governing Board, and our committee members, subcommittee leaders, general volunteers, and Executive Director ensure that we fulfill our mission effectively. Our 53rd year as an Association was busy and productive; it was full of professional development, networking, and educational opportunities for our members. We continued to enhance offerings while staying fiscally and administratively responsible.

Highlights of the work NEACAC conducted this year touched upon membership engagement, efforts towards inclusion and staffing changes. When Erin Regan took over as President, one of her first initiatives was to form an ad-hoc committee on Crisis Response. The goal of this group was to come up with best practices as it related to NEACAC's involvement in and response to tragedy, crisis in schools/campuses, and resources for members. This committee has been extended to November 2019 to continue their work. A motion was put forth in the summer of 2018 to update NEACAC's registration forms and items linked to events to reflect gender inclusive language. This was passed and implemented after many months of research by a working group.

Previous ad-hoc committees (volunteers and mentorship) have begun their formal work within the normal structure of NEACAC. Members now have a formal way to sign up for involvement in committees/working groups, while mentorship initiatives are well underway for Summer 2019.

This past summer we welcomed the new Executive Director of NEACAC, Christina Doyle. At the end of this cycle, Christina has hired a part time administrative assistant for NEACAC, Christina Beauchemin.

This Annual Report details a number of NEACAC's accomplishments during the 2018-2019 year.

# President Erin Regan School Counselor at Sharon High School, Sharon MA

It has been an honor and a privilege to serve as President of NEACAC this year. Our volunteers that make this organization run effectively to serve the professional development needs of our members are truly amazing and it was a pleasure to work alongside them this year.

This summer the Governing Board voted to create an Ad-Hoc Committee to look incorporating Gender Inclusive Language into our association, with a specific goal of developing registration forms for programs that host overnight guests. Dayna Bradstreet from Simmons University took the lead on this project. After months of crafting language and consulting with experts in the field, the Governing Board voted in February to adopt a policy for overnight event registration. Further, we changed the few places in our by-laws that did not use gender inclusive language. The group is continuing their work and will share their goals at the May Governing Board meeting.

In addition to the Ad-Hoc Committee, the Governing Board also voted to initiate a working group regarding Crisis responses. The goal of this group was to explore the role that NEACAC could play when a crisis occurs and impacts our communities. Jay Cloutier and Kathryn Dromey assembled a group and they began defining what needed to be looked at and how a committee could help this process. Ultimately they broke the group into four sub-sections and utilized the volunteer application form to find members interested in this work. They began their work and will provide and update to the Governing Board in May.

With a goal of increasing school counselor memberships, I attended two local school counselor association meetings in Massachusetts to promote NEACAC and share the benefits of membership. I am grateful to these associations who willingly shared their time with me. We were approached by NEASC, the New England Association of Schools and Colleges to participate in their regional conference in December and to present on a panel. Four of our members including our Executive Director attended. The panel was a success and we plan to continue this partnership with NEASC in the coming year.

Overall, the members of the Executive and Governing Boards of NEACAC continue to amaze me with their willingness to give freely of their time and expertise. I know that we will continue to grow and prosper as an association because of our tremendous leaders.

As President this year, I liaised with the Government Relations (GRAC) and the Two-Year College Committees. As Sharon Veatch, Chair of GRAC, will likely share, GRAC enjoyed a very successful year. They planned and executed two Days on the Hill in Connecticut and Massachusetts this year. Executive Board members, GRAC members, and other members of NEACAC attended both days to advocate for school counselors and access to affordable higher education opportunities.

Donna Walker led her committee for the third year and will continue for another 3-year cycle. One of the goals of this committee was to create and implement a Two-Year and Transfer Forum/Professional Development opportunity for members in conjunction with the Professional Development Committee. The committee spent much of the year researching the best time to implement a new program to ensure strong attendance. Ultimately the committee opted to postpone the new program for another year to solicit feedback from school counselors regarding the best time of year to access this program. In addition, the committee established a goal to recruit more members from each state in New England.

One of the highlights of my year as President was representing NEACAC on the national level with Erin Earle and Andrew Rosabianca. Together we listened carefully to issues being presented and were able to discuss and debate as a presidential team how to best represent NEACAC and our members. We were able to provide feedback to the presented Membership model which informed NACAC's thoughts as they updated the proposal. We collaborated with other ACAC's to share best practices that we can ultimately bring back to New England. I believe our organization grows stronger each year when we join forces with our affiliate counterparts.

# Past-President Andrew Rosabianca Director of Admission Operations at St. Anselm College, Manchester NH

My most notable accomplishments this year came with the work I did with the committees I liaised with, the Harry Carroll selection committee that I chaired, and serving as Chief Delegate at the NACAC Assembly. Specifically with the Nominating Committee, the biggest accomplishment was researching online voting systems, and successfully implementing a system to increase voter participation. Also, I chaired the selection committee for the Harry Carroll award and brought together past recipients to discuss and select this year's award recipient. Finally, I was honored to serve as Chief Delegate this year for the NACAC Assembly. This year's group of NEACAC Assembly Delegates impressed me by their dedication to the issues that we faced, their consideration in what we voted on, and for their establishment of a motion that was put forward at Assembly. When I was President, I encouraged leaders and members to use their voice, and that was so present with the work of our Assembly Delegates this year.

This year, I worked with the Admission Practices Committee and the Nominating Committee. With the Admission Practices Committee, we worked on ways that they could the work they do throughout the year with the Governing Board. Seeing as their work is confidential, we looked to find ways that they could share general issues they are facing, and to help us learn how to be better professionals in our field and share that information with our offices. The Nominating Committee accomplished much over the past year. This was the first year in a long time when two in-person meetings were held. The meetings were valuable because the committee was able to discuss and establish policies around elections and nominations for positions and awards. One of those discussions turned into a potential bylaws change that is being considered at this year's Membership Meeting. In addition to these policies, a diverse slate of candidates was selected to run for open spots for President, Treasurer, Secretary, and Assembly Delegates. We researched and implemented a new online voting system as well to highlight candidates more effectively and also make it easier for members to vote. The foundation that was laid this past year with the committee will allow the committee to further develop policies and strengthen the voting system that was put in place this year.

Serving in the Presidential cycle for NEACAC has been an absolute pleasure and honor. I have enjoyed serving with others in the Presidential cycle (Jon Westover, Sherri Geller, Erin Regan, and Erin Earle), and have enjoyed collaborating with them to move our organization forward. I am also deeply appreciative of all of the NEACAC Governing Board and Executive Board members I have served with. Their thoughtful discussions helped advance our work, and I am proud of all we have accomplished together. Finally, I would like to thank the members for putting their trust in me to lead NEACAC, and for the work they do for NEACAC and in their daily work.

# President-Elect Erin Earle Associate Director/Director of Campus Visit Experience at The University of Rhode Island, Kingston RI

I was charged with filling the soon to be vacant committee chair positions on our Governing Board. For this cycle there were 10 positions that needed to be filled. I worked the outgoing chairs to get suggestions about who might make good successors. I then outreached to the potential chairs to gauge their interest and discuss the roles. I then presented presented 10 qualified, excited, and dedicated potential committee chairs to the Governing Board for their approval. They were all unanimously approved.

This year the Communications Committee had two important policies that they drafted and put before the Governing Board for approval. I provided support and clarification for both of these documents. The first was a social media policy. This policy addressed topics such as representatives posting on NEACAC pages needing to know and adhere to its Mission Statement, Bylaws and Articles of Organization when using social media in reference to NEACAC. Additionally, it stated that reps should indicate when they are posting on behalf of a committee when posting on the NEACAC social media pages. It also addressed photography consent and confidential information. The second policy the Communications Committee got approval on was a document on advertising opportunities with NEACAC. This included web, e-blast, and newsletter options. It outlined pricing rates and provided responses to frequently asked questions as well as gave clarity on who could advertise with NEACAC

The Member Relations Committee sought to gain a better understanding of our membership breakdown. This included a collaboration with the new Executive Director to ensure that we had an accurate snapshot about who are members are. This will allow the Members Relations committee to be able to quantify their success next year to see if their goals of increasing membership was successful particularly for school counselors. Additionally, I worked with the new subcommittee for volunteers. In their first year as a subcommittee I provided guidance on next steps as they transitioned from an Ad-hoc. They continued to implement the recommendations set forth by the research done on this topic. They recognize volunteers monthly in our e-blasts and will be showcasing them at our AMC next week. They also have continued to reach out to committee chairs about vacant position on committee and have maintained an application for members to apply with. Recently they worked with the ED to get a volunteer tab on our website! Although a simple thing this is a big deal for our Associations goals to allow all members to know about opportunities and express interest.

I am proud of the work the Executive Board and Governing Board did in the creation of our gender inclusive language policies. I felt the Board was extremely thoughtful in making sure our Association was more inclusive in our work. I was proud to be part of this important change.

## Vice President Erik DeAngelis Associate Director of Admission at Brown University, Providence RI

As Vice President, my primary duties included supporting the President in fielding issues and making decisions. I was also responsible for organizing meeting agendas and allocating time to ensure momentum in completing business. Given that I was involved in two of the Association's largest and most active committees, most of my time was spent connecting with these committees (Professional Development and Annual Meeting & Conference).

I liaised with both the Professional Development and Annual Meeting & Conference committees.

On the Professional Development committee, we primarily worked on ensuring the regularly scheduled programs were supported and executed without issue. Specific programs which had more work done included the Adopt A District Program and the Advanced Secondary School Counselor Institute (ASSCSI).

Adopt A District completed its 3-year term with Bridgeport, CT schools and the E-Board directed PD to launch a second cycle. This will be charged to the incoming chair of PD for his term. We took into consideration feedback from participants in the program to make the decision to move forward with another round.

ASSCI was scheduled to take place as an every 2-year program. The last attempt at ASSCSI was cancelled due to a low registration rate. We reinvisioned the program to add it as a pre-conference-type option to Annual Meeting & Conference this year and maintain the commitment to host the program at Roger Williams University. Many conference calls and hours of planning went into marketing, communication and promotion, but unfortunately registration did not get to a critical mass in order to justify the time and cost of the program; therefore it was cancelled. The incoming Board will evaluate the program and make decisions moving forward to create and support programs for school counseling members.

On the Annual Meeting & Conference committee, my role was to be the point person for activities related to the Executive Board, Governing Board, and official Association business. The AMC committee was reduced slightly this year and consolidated to create more accountability for individual programs and initiatives. New initiatives included a Career Center, Solution Center, reintroduction of a Counselors' College Fair, and a new session review process. By all accounts, this committee is self-sufficient and launched a successful 2019 AMC at The University of Rhode Island. I would encourage reading the AMC Chair section of the report for further details.

I am happy with my term as Vice President this past year. I was able to contribute a voice to our Executive Board when issues arose, utilize my organizational skills to keep us on track and on task towards our goals, and support two large NEACAC committees. The largest challenge was making the

decision to cancel the ASSCSI program; ultimately it showed the type of collaboration and efforts our volunteers put forward to attempt to launch successful programs.

## Treasurer Amy Tiberio Assistant Vice President & Dean of Admission at Roger Williams University, Bristol RI

As noted above, I collaborated with Owen and provided guidance on the development of the finance committee proposals for college fairs and investment funds. Owen Bligh and I also developed and provided a training for committee chairs on the budget process. I met with the finance committee to review FY20 budget requests and begin building the FY20 budget. I also worked with Meghan to help problem-solve college fair sites and to ensure that the Strive Scan pilot would continue for spring.

I am proud of all the above accomplishments; however, I am most proud of my ability and privilege to lend my voice to discussions about important issues in the organization. From most effective use of funds, to discussions about gender identity and housing, to conversations about programming, I have enjoyed contributing to discussions with dedicated colleagues who truly care about our profession.

#### Secretary Cicily Shaw Director of College Counseling at Boston Trinity Academy, Boston MA

I believe my role in accurately recording minutes helped to better organize the meetings.

In my role as liaison, I provided support where need to both the IDEA Committee and the Current Trends Committee. While there were no significant accomplishments that I would take credit for, I believe by providing support, the committee chairs were better able to complete their tasks.

Executive Director Christina Doyle NEACAC

In my role as an ex-officio Executive Board member, my work continues from year to year - collaborating with new Executive Board and Governing Board members every year. Some highlights from this year include the following. I worked very closely with our Treasurer, Amy Tiberio, as we worked to make sure the budget and all recordings were accurate. We work closely with our bookkeeper, auditors, and accountants throughout this process. I am working to transition our forms and documents to our google drive to improve accessibility and continuity. I am working to compile a complete record/history of our events (for example, college fairs) in order to help us evaluate our successes as well as areas that might

need a little more attention. I am working to make sure we are maintaining the correct insurance for our organization as well as the many different events that we host. I worked with the Executive Board to hire our new Administrative Assistant, who is currently training and excited to jump in and get to know our membership as she assists NEACAC in our endeavors.

While I work with all of our committees closely, the committees that I liaise with are Articles of Organization and By-Laws and Sponsorship. A large portion of my work with the Sponsorship committee pertained to supporting them through the Annual Meeting & Conference. With Articles of Organization and By-Laws, my work also pertained to the Annual Meeting & Conference as I helped to facilitate the preparation for two votes at the 2019 Annual Meeting & Conference.

This has been an exceptional first year in this position. I have been developing relationships with all of the committee chairs, not only the two that I liaise. I am enjoying the development of relationships with our membership as well. I have also spent time sorting out and organizing our database so that we can develop accurate snapshots of our membership- that can change on a daily basis! I look forward to becoming more involved with committee meetings and events.

## Admission Practices Jill Britton at Westbrook High School (CT)

As you know, it's been a wild year in the realm of Admissions Practices. Staying on top of the many situations with DOJ, Scandals, and various violations, not to mention the replacement of the SPGP to the CEEP. I am just proud to be keeping up with the news and the drama of this year. Additionally we rolled off Jim Fowler as committee co-chair, and rolled on Jim Tweed. Jim Fowler's expertise and guidance were missed as Jim Tweed and I gained experience in his absence.

The onslaught of information and the retiring of two upper level "mainstays" in our NACAC AP Committee was also big news, (Raquel Bailey and Joyce Smith).

Outgoing Chair? NO

<u>Goals for 2019-2020</u>: I would like to do more outreach via the state counseling associations once the CEEP is all set. I plan to speak with Liz Cheron (National AP Chair) regarding this goal at the Annual Meeting.

### Annual Meeting & Conference Christina Berardi at Salve Regina University (RI)

This year our committee, in conjunction with the new NEACAC Executive Director registered and prepared an engaging conference for over 650 (not counting any walk-ins) colleagues. This group includes representation from both sides of the desk and this year, many of our local CBO professionals. The total attendees are 80 more than the registration numbers (pre-walk-ins) for the Keene State Conference.

Additionally, we have roughly 50 individuals joining us for the first coming together pre-conference for NEACAC. This was modeled after NYSACAC's tradition and is bringing in presenters in a different format than our traditional opportunities to launch into the theme "Making our Mission our Action." This program is a true collaboration with NECBAC and will no doubt be an impactful program.

We have brought back the counselor's college fair and I have personally heard from some out of region school counselors that opportunity and/or the bus tour options are what is driving them to NEACAC's AMC this year. The evening 5k with the incentive of a local favorite, Del's Frozen Lemonade will be a fun way to break from our traditional programming and the inclusion of the Assembly Delegates will allow the membership to meet this group and have more casual conversations about their goals for NACAC.

Additionally, our committee has done an incredible job working with URI as a large state institution. Holding the conference at this type of institution does offer some additional obstacles and red tape, but everyone at URI and NEACAC have worked tirelessly to provide a valuable conference.

Internally, we did transition this year to a google account for AMC that allowed us to move all forms and surveys as well as keep a drive of all work throughout. This will allow for a better transition each year from chair to chair and allow for better continuity and ease of updating and executing many aspects of the conference.

We look forward to seeing how the conference goes and receiving feedback from all involved.

Our Sponsorship efforts proved to be a bigger challenge this year than we had anticipated. We would have loved to see more involvement and support after the Super Conference from the many vendors associated with our field. We ended up working with many late in the cycle to include them in the conference and due to inconsistent communication and instructions have had to invest additional time to managing their expectations and working them through the registration process. We also intend to make sure this group is catered to with the highest level of customer service and thanked by not only our committee but also NEACAC leadership during the conference.

We also faced some issues transitioning to a new designer and printer for our save the date postcard and program booklet. We needed to get non-profit paperwork in order to mail out this first piece which

delayed it slightly, but the new team of designer and printer were not only very responsive and helpful but also very skilled. This allowed these to be edited with much less stress from our committee, fewer errors and less cost.

The contract execution with the host site was also delayed. From when we accepted the bid to when the majority of the conference planning began, a new professional took over the role of summer conferences. There needed to be a lot of back and forth as records were not kept in that office regarding the commitments for the bid. In the end, URI did honor the bid, the new professional has been incredible to work with (very responsive and helpful) and we even received a \$5 less per person per night price for our lodging. This savings is very much appreciated.

#### Outgoing Chair? YES

<u>Goals for 2019-2020</u>: We'd love to see the committee do more with the local state government and department of education and/or principles association to put out targeted information regarding the value of the conference to school counselors in the area. Every year we give scholarships, this year, 10 institutions and organizations provided over \$4,000 to support professionals to attend, but even when granted financial support some were not able to follow through and attend as they weren't given the time out of their office.

We'd also love to see our conference promoted more to an external audience. We offer great value with the size of our event (compared to other ACAC affiliates) and the composition of professionals who attend. Our primary forms of advertisement focus on our existing membership and those in New England. More outreach outside our geographical region may help to not only grow the conference but also provide additional prospectives to the learning environment we create.

Finally, it is always a goal to engage more higher level professionals in this event. This year our programming committee did outreach directly to those who we hoped would present at the conference, but our mix remains very similar to past years. I think more can be done to incentivize these individuals and in the end, lead to an even more engaging conference for both attendees (including our always large number of newcomers) and vendors.

## Articles of Organization & By-Laws Jayson Hodge at University of Connecticut (CT)

It was a regular year. Nothing of consequence really happened.

Goals for 2019-2020:

College Fairs Meghan Monaco at Endicott College (MA) Most proud of continuing the work keep our college fairs as the standard and premier fairs in the region. There is still work to be done, but I believe I'm leaving College Fairs in a good place for the incoming chair to initiate change.

College Fair Attendance and Turnover Among On-Site Contacts

Outgoing Chair? YES

<u>Goals for 2019-2020</u>: I think there is a lot of opportunity for improvement with our college fair programs, which I have discussed with our incoming chair. We need to continue to identify ways to increase prospective student attendance at fairs, not only ways to please college reps. I did not have the opportunity to form a College Fair Committee comprised of non-on-site chairs, which I think is the first step to see improvement. Ideally this Committee can focus on marketing efforts for each fair, so on-site can focus on the logistics of the event.

# Communication Services Lisa Ellrich at University of Maine, Farmington (ME)

Most proud would be the finalizing of a social media policy for the organization. It was a long-time coming but I'm thrilled it has been accomplished.

Membership is a bit of an issue. It has been a bit of a hurdle to get some of the initiatives off the ground given the changes to the ED and their role. One of the biggest would be updating the web as it needs to be done by the ED. Committee members spend time finding areas to update but don't see it happening. This causes them to become disinterested as they feel they have no real impact.

## Outgoing Chair? YES

<u>Goals for 2019-2020</u>: Firming up a solid team that will feel like their voice/choices/work matter. I have spoken with the new chair about some of these issues and she is aware of some of the frustrations. I did state that I thought now that the ED had been in place for a while and has additional assistance that should help move the needle a bit.

# **Crisis Response – AD-HOC COMMITTEE** \*renewed to November 2019 **Kathryn Dromey at Agawam High School (MA)**

The committee is in the process of surveying the membership on ideas and beliefs about how our association responds to crises. We are looking for feedback on ideas such as offering funds in the wake of a crisis and developing safety protocols for high school visits.

Initially we needed to find committee members and we were able to do so through word of mouth and through the NEACAC volunteer application.

### Professional Development Kate Innes at Simmons University (MA)

In this past year, the Professional Development committee worked on several major programs, including the Middle Management Workshop as part of the AMC pre-conference sessions, Summer Institute in July, the Students in Admissions Forum in September, the Adopt-a-District program in November, and the Career Colloquium in March. The committee also continued to work with the Two Year Colleges committee to plan a transfer forum (now postponed), and the Advanced Secondary School Counselor Summer Institute (ASSCSI), which was unfortunately canceled for 2019. Under the PD committee, the Mentorship Committee also took shape and is now ready to match mentors and mentees, with an application available on the NEACAC website. I am most proud of continuing to provide great PD opportunities with a committee that is able to be open to all!

We faced a few challenges this year. With the Adopt-a-District program, a change in leadership in the Bridgeport school system left us no contact to plan our PD with. However, we were able to work around and with the help of a local NEACAC member (Holly Franquet), gain access to the counselor group directly. In the end we hosted a productive PD day, and the surveys and feedback from the counselors showed it was valuable and worthwhile. We also faced the challenge of low attendance for the ASSCSI program, which was ultimately canceled. Even though the program was re-imagined to connect with the AMC, the structure and/or timing did not end up attracting enough participants. It will be important to determine the right type of program for counselors in the future!

The fall before last, when many institutions were changing their test reporting policies at rapid rates, confusion and angst emerged with college counselors. I brought this up as a point of discussion at a governing board meeting, expressing how something that seems so minor and even helpful to one could create worry in another. NEACAC supported my statement and saw a void not only for our organization but for the admissions world as a whole. We continued the dialogue within the delegate group and decided that we, NEACAC, would create a motion for the 2018 Assembly in Salt Lake City. We asked the NACAC Board of Directors to consider establishing a working group to review institutions' policies on self-reported test scores. It was our hope that best practices for communicating policies for self-reported scores could be established and that NACAC could manage the database. Also, last year, as Chair of Summer Institute I changed how gender is asked on our housing form. I wanted to allow members to not be confined to "Male/Female/Other." This change led to a working group on how we as an organization will gender beyond just the SI form. From this, we now have inclusive, non-binary language in every NEACAC form.
